I had the honour of acting as one of Your Royal Highness's advisors in the setting up of the A4S Project.

As always with Your Royal Highness in typical enthusiastic leadership role, we buzzed with excitement and promise.

The timing of this vital initiative was perfect. There was a clear need for reevaluation of accounting procedures. The profession was ready for a good kicking, and the Project team were excellent centre forwards.

One is to ensure that all effects which might add to inequality in any form are identified and given a value. This should apply to losses of critical biodiversity in key global "hotspots" advancing the concept of the "Equator Principles" to all bank lending and project assessment procedures.

The other is to create a base level training for accountants the world over which provide scope for moral judgements on all of their accountability performance to be recognised and included in all sign-off procedures.

I feel A4S can be transformed to accomplish this role simply because of its great successes and its wide range of enthusiastic practitioners.

I look forward to seeing the path-breaking outcomes of continuous and permanent improvements in all aspects of accounting and accountability to ensure that all life on this wondrous and unique planet has a viable chance of compassionate survival.
